# FACE TO FACE WITH ROB LOWE BY CHRIS CROSS, PHOTO BY ALAN BAILEY



Rob is the sort of person who quietly goes about his business and does not seek the limelight and yet has made a big impact on the quality of sporting life in Byfield and Daventry. Married to the effervescent Marilyn and living in the heart of the village opposite the War Memorial, he has also been at the heart of some of the decisions and responsibilities bettering the leisure life of Byfield residents over the past few decades.

Rob was born in Northampton on May 2<sup>nd</sup> 1948 but moved to West Street in Banbury when he was 2 years old. The house there backed on to the railway, marshalling yards and sports ground ... perhaps a pointer to Rob's future lifetime involvement with sport. As a child Rob attended St. Leonard's Primary School and then Banbury Grammar School. His first ever trophy was won playing in the Primary Schools Football Final at Banbury Spencer ground but his love for football had

to take a second place to rugby at the Grammar School. However, he still kept his footie skills going on the side by playing for the Boys' Brigade and Old Easingtonians. Strangely, his involvement with cricket had to wait until, as an adult he started playing for Byfield Cricket Club. Part of the reason for this was that his father was such an outstanding cricketer that Rob was told, "You'll never be as good as your dad!", and so he didn't even try. In fact, his father was one of the 20 founders of Banbury Twenty Cricket Club (hence the name).

On leaving school Rob decided not to go to University so looked for a sandwich scheme where he could train as an accountant. He started with Ford in Essex, attending North East London Polytechnic at the same time, then came to Daventry.

Rob met his future wife, Marilyn, as she worked in Banbury and moved in the same social circles. They started life together at Bodicote Chase but after 5 years Rob was finding the travelling back and forwards to Daventry a bit onerous and also wanted the children to attend a village school. So the couple bought a property in Byfield, although before they could move into it they had to undertake 6 month's hard work of renovating, especially as no-one had been upstairs for 15 years!

Rob is a proud family man and father of Daniel (who has just come back from Australia and is living in Poole), Sam (currently in Australia and married with 3 children) and Amy (with her partner and baby in Woodford Halse).

Rob worked for 40 years at Ford, retiring in early 2005. during this time being heavily involved in Ford Sports and Social Club, both as Treasurer and Chairman. In addition, he was the President of the highly successful Ford Sports Football team, who were winners of the UCL premier division twice and several other trophies and FA cup encounters. Rob's accounting skills were well used by Daventry Rugby Club, who made him a Life Vice President and Guest of Honour at their annual lunch as a result.

For virtually the whole time he has been in Byfield Rob has been Treasurer of the Cricket Club and helped with the Village Hall Committee and the formation of the Brightwell Recreation Ground Association. He also ran Byfield Summer Skittles League for several years after the passing of Albert Wheeler. Currently he acts as village correspondent for the local papers ensuring all our events are recorded in the village column. In his spare time Rob now enjoys reading, walking and studying antiques. He is a keen member of Daventry Ramblers and takes his turn in organising walks .... you sometimes see him round the village heading a posse of people equipped with boots and sticks and looking very intent on eating up the miles!

On the antiques front you may have caught an episode of Antiques Road Show 2 years ago



from Broughton Castle which featured Rob, Marilyn and an ornate silver tankard which excited experts and presenters alike. Marilyn wanted to go along and have her silver piece of eight valued and as an afterthought the couple took with them a tankard in a bureau which had been left to Rob by his father. Amazingly the experts were not very interested in Marilyn's piece of eight but the tankard (which you can see in the photo) caused a great frisson of speculation. Originally they thought it came from the Dutch East Indies and was late 18<sup>th</sup> century. In the event, after careful scrutiny by even greater experts, it was revealed to be actually late 16<sup>th</sup> century,

English and extremely rare, the only other examples being in the Queen's collection at Windsor. It was thought to be worth about £25000 but actually sold for a bit more (although of course commission etc. had to come off that). This proved to be the sort of windfall we all dream of and has enabled Rob and Marilyn to set up a fund for visits to the family in Australia. Most of their holidays are now taken there so they tend not to travel anywhere else abroad.

After a very busy life Rob is now content with his lot and to be where he is. He still aims to lead an active life both physically and continue with his village involvement ... as long as the body keeps up! And so say all of us!!!

# Face to face questions for Rob

#### 1. What is your earliest memory?

Being on the footplate of a steam locomotive and watching fried egg being cooked on the shovel. I was taken there by a neighbour who was either an engine driver or fireman and our house in West Street actually backed onto the Banbury marshalling yards.

#### 2. As a child you wanted to be?

A professional footballer or cricketer.

#### 3. Advice you would give your teenage self?

Not to play the fool at school and waste time. Someone told me, 'If you play the fool at school, that's all you'll be able to play afterwards!' That thought jolted me into suddenly working hard in the fifth form so I could go on to the sixth.

#### 4. Your best quality?

That's not for me to say! (His wife Marilyn said," He is a good organiser and he's kind .... sometimes!")

#### 5. And your worst?

I do not suffer fools gladly!

## 6. Something that really irritates you?

Inequality, bias and political decisions made purely for political ends.

#### 7. Lark or owl?

Definitely a lark. I like to be up by 7 a.m so I can walk down to the shop and collect my paper when it first arrives then have a couple of hours to myself before Marilyn emerges. It is my best time of the day when I can think the clearest.

### 8. One thing that would make your life better?

New knees! I think a lifetime of playing sport has over worked them.

### 9. Who would you most like to be stuck on a desert island with?

Ray Mears, the survival specialist, so he could get us off it quickly!

## 10. One thing you can't live without (apart from family and friends)?

Walking ... for the enjoyment of the open air, the time to 'stand and stare' and also the camaraderie that walking with others brings.

### 11. If you won the lottery how would you spend it?

I would donate the money for a new village hall, enlarge the Brightwell field so it contained two separate football pitches and erect a state of the art pavilion.

## 12. The most valuable thing you've gained from living in Byfield?

A sense of belonging and community.

### **13. When are you truly happiest?**

In the pub after a good walk with friends and family.

### 14. Last chosen meal on this Earth?

Chateaubriand with a Margaret River Cabernet Sauvignon. I am particularly attached to this wine as I met it when I went on my son Sam's honeymoon in Australia's Margaret River region with 23 others. (Yes really! Apparently Sam's new wife invited Byfield cricket players and partners to enjoy their holiday with them!)

# **Byfield Parish Council**

The Parish Council has its own website <u>www.byfieldparishcouncil.org.uk/</u> where all agendas, minutes and useful documents can be seen. The Parish Council normally meets on the second Thursday of the month in the meeting room of the village hall starting at 19.30 hrs. Members of the press and public are always welcome to attend.

#### Chairman's Report

The start of 2018 sees our County Council facing severe financial problems and passing a budget with huge cuts in services. One particular sad loss for our village is the axing of the mobile library service although there is a replacement of sorts called Library to You, to find out more email Woodford Halse Library <u>woodlib@firstforwellbeing.co.uk</u>. Unfortunately, the library is only open one day per week for 4 hours so a response maybe delayed.

Unlike County and District Councils the Parish Council does not have any statutory obligation to provide services although here in Byfield we aim to provide a range of facilities and services for our community. Fortunately, Parish Councils are not subject to financial capping but most (including Byfield) only have one assured revenue stream which is the precept charged to all households in the Parish. In building our budget for 2018/19 we were mindful of needing to try and improve the village and although this has resulted in an increase in the precept we have also agreed to spend some of our reserves to keep that increase to a minimum without impacting on the benefits we aim to bring to our community.

#### Parish Council and Local (District) elections

The District and Parish Council elections in May. If you are interested in serving our community, please keep an eye out for the Notice of Elections which will appear on our noticeboard next to the petrol station. Alternatively go to:

Everyone is welcome to stand and with 11 places to fill there is a distinct need for villagers to come forward. The existing Parish Council would particularly encourage those with an interest in grant applications and helping to manage a social media presence / communication strategy to seek nomination.

Parish Councillor Alan Bailey will retire in April and we are very grateful to him for his efforts and contributions, he will stay active with the Royal British Legion and the Big Breakfast as well as his interest in vintage motorbikes.

District Councillor Bob Patchett has looked after the interests of Byfield for two terms now and has decided to step down in May. Bob has been a friend to our village and a great support to the Parish Council, we wish him good luck in the things he does next.

### **Brightwell Recreation Ground**

The Brightwell is a public open space owned and managed by the Parish Council, we believe that it is a great asset to the village and know that it is well used by both folks from Byfield and further

afield. The efforts of a small number of volunteers keep it in good condition particularly considering the amount of use it gets.

We experience occasional graffiti on the sport pavilion which is frustrating, unsightly and just costs time and effort to rectify. If anyone has any knowledge of who is doing this, please contact the clerk or any parish councillor.

#### Planning

The Parish Council continues to engage with the Medical Centre on the matter of a new surgery and 90 new houses.

All other planning applications, parish council comments and the record of decisions can be found in the Parish Council minutes on our website. Items of interest recently include:

Listed Building Consent for various internal and external repairs and alterations – Banbury Lane

Single storey rear extension and two storey side extension, internal and external repairs and alterations – Banbury Lane

Raising height of existing front gable – Westhorpe Mews

Plans for a rear and front extension in Becketts Close were approved as was an application to demolish and replace the school hall

#### Footpaths

We continue to monitor the local footpaths and to engage with the landowners (who have responsibility for things like gates and stiles). Please report any problems to Cllr Alan Bailey.

One particular problem area at the moment is the footpath from the Twistle to the reservoir where there is an increasing amount of uncollected dog faeces. This is disgusting and simply because the path is in open countryside does not excuse dog owners from collecting the droppings and taking them away. Please follow the country code and clean up!

#### Traffic Monitoring

The "Parish Council owns a Speed Monitoring Device (SID) which is moved regularly around the village to collect data on traffic volumes and speed and also to act as a reminder to drivers if they are speeding i.e. over 30 mph within the village confines. SID has recently been installed on the Woodford Road monitoring traffic coming into the village. We are interested in the volume of traffic as the new housing development in Woodford Halse is occupied.

Our data collection in the High Street showed that most traffic was driving within the national speed limits.

#### **Pocket Park - Working Party**

We have work starting to clear the hedge between the allotments and the Farndon Road, and also to clear some of the very old elders between the wood and the allotments. Once this has been finished, I plan to get some whips of young hedging plants, to replace the hedge with native trees and plants. We are also looking at some replacement fencing and some tree removal as this area has not had any maintenance for many years.

If you would like to come and help clear/ nurture in 2018 there will always be biscuits and hot drinks. We usually work from 10 -12. Please bring tools. Dates for the next few months are:

# LibraryPlus Mobile Library Service – immediate withdrawal of service

As you will no doubt be aware, the public consultation around the future of the Library Service has included the deletion of the Mobile Library Service and the service has been running as normal pending the final Council decision.

However, due to the age and the condition of the vehicle, there is a risk of incurring expensive repair work each time it goes out and the recent spending controls imposed by the Director of Finance under Section 114 mean that we have had to withdraw the service with immediate effect.

We will be contacting all existing Mobile Library customers individually to explain the situation. We have also made arrangements for our Mobile Library Driver to continue to visit the mobile library stops for one last visit to see as many customers as possible. He will be stopping at the normal place at the normal time, but in a different vehicle, to collect stock from customers. If customers are not able to attend the last mobile library visit they can return any items to any of our libraries. All overdue charges will be waived.

Any residents who would like to continue to use the library service, but are unable to visit their nearest library, can be considered for home delivery through our Library to You service. They can either speak to our mobile van driver at his last visit, or contact their nearest library for further details.

More information on a planned expansion of the Library to You service will be announced in due course.




# John Owen, son of Byfield, mass murderer 1870

The Denham Massacre: Nineteenth-century Britain's Most Shocking House of Horror Murders

What role does Byfield play in the one of the worst crimes of 19<sup>th</sup> century British criminal history I hear you ask? Well, the answer is that John Owen, who was born and bred in Byfield was responsible for murdering a family of 7 people on 22 May 1870. This crime was an international news story which appeared on the front page of the Police Illustrated News two weeks running. I came across this almost forgotten story by accident 4 years ago, and after discovering it, set out to find out what happened. Who were the victims? What was the motive? Who was the culprit, and what happened to him?



As a result of my research, Thames Valley Police Museum produced a new glass display cabinet with items from the murders. The crime was one of awful violence and brutality where three generations of one family were axed to death by a cold blooded murderer, John Owen. His father had been a tailor and the family were very well thought of locally. John did not follow his father's occupation, but he became an apprentice to local blacksmith Thomas Mason. During his apprenticeship, John suffered a nasty blow to the head while working at the Byfield Rectory. This may have had serious consequences for John later on.

Owen left Byfield and moved to Shipston, where he started getting into trouble. He was charged with stealing a gun and was later referred to by the locals as 'Jack the cat killer'. He later left the area

to go 'tramping' the country. He regularly got himself into trouble for stealing things. Eventually he fell out with the blacksmith in the village of Denham, Bucks over a debt when Owen decided to visit the blacksmith and take his revenge. This resulted in 7 murders being perpetrated by Owen.

The house must truly have resembled a house of horror. The victims were aged 4, 6, 8, 32, 34, 36 and 77, and had all suffered appalling head injuries.



# Gearing up for major bin collection changes this summer

People living in Daventry District are encouraged to find out more about major changes to their waste and recycling collections launching this summer.

The new 123+ waste and recycling collection service will start in June 2018, delivered by Daventry Norse, a new joint venture between Daventry District Council (DDC) and Norse Commercial Services Ltd.

From June 2018 households in Daventry District will receive:

- 1 weekly food waste collection
- 2 weekly mixed recycling collection in a new blue-lidded wheelie bin
- 3 weekly general waste black bin collection
- + Plus an optional 2-weekly garden waste service for an annual fee of £35 per bin a year.

The changes are being introduced as Daventry District cannot afford to carry on with its current waste and recycling service, both environmentally and financially. Changing black bin collections from fortnightly to three-weekly will help encourage more recycling and reduce the money spent on treating and disposing of rubbish.

The Council will also be improving the recycling service to help residents slim their bins, introducing a new wheelie bin for mixed recycling that provides more space over two weeks than the current recycling boxes collected weekly.

It is likely that collection days will change for households from June 2018 in order to introduce the new service arrangements across the District. Further details will be provided to all households nearer to the time, including an information pack and new calendar.




